#### Project Update June 2024

#### WELLS

JR-1

JR-1 is in service.

#### TREATMENT PLANT

- We continue to operate with two staff in the water department.
- I have been working on the water and sewer rules and regulations with Pare Corporation to finalize a draft for the commission to review.
- The RIDOH collected a second round of samples from the North Reservoir and well JR-1 for PFAS analysis.

#### TRANSFER PUMPING/RESERVOIR

The north reservoir is at capacity and spilling over. No water has been transferred from South Pond.

#### **DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM**

South Pond @ 6 MG Usable Storage, 6 Million Gallons

North Pond @ 60 MG

Usable Storage 60 Million Gallons


- Staff worked with the recreation department to connect the Mackerel Cove life guard and bathroom building for the season.
- The watermain replacement project on High Street will continue in the next few weeks with the connection of Clinton Avenue to the new main. Once that connection is complete the old main can be disconnected at Green lane.
- Atlas Painting has completed the concrete splash pads at both overflow discharge pipes from the tanks.
- I am working with Jean Lambert to determine the scope of our inventory program for lead service lines on our water distribution system. Lead services are located on the cast iron distribution mains. Many of the services have been replaced over the years by the water department and home owners. A notice will be mailed to homeowners asking for their assistance in identifying the service pipe in their home. Inspections will be conducted by the staff to create our inventory that is due by October 16th to the RIDOH.
- Staff completed water service installations on Pemberton Avenue, Longfellow, and Ocean Avenue.

#### WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

- The monthly average daily flow at the treatment plant for May was 0.53 million gallons per day. The monthly average allowed by our discharge permit is 0.73 million gallons per day. The peak daily flow was 1.69 million gallons due to rain storms.
- Weston and Sampson will have a draft assessment report for the wastewater facility and pump stations submitted for review by the end of June.
- There are two facilities in the State of Rhode Island that process sludge from Wastewater plants. I was just informed by RIDEM that the Woonsocket Facility is closing which impacts 30 wastewater facilities. The facility in Cranston where we send our waste is beginning to feel the pressure due to the volume of waste that they are receiving. We will continue monitoring the issue as it may affect how sludge is accepted and processed in Rhode Island. There will be an increase in cost if sludge is sent to facilities out of state for disposal.



ADMINISTRATOR MELLO: Yes. So, in your packet is a memo asking that the council consider an extension of the moratorium that was put in six months ago. It was set to expire the first week of July. This is your last opportunity to extend that, if you so chose.

So, as you know, there is a significant amount of work that has been done in the past six months related to the build-out analysis which was -- went through a number of drafts and was approved by the commission, working with our consultant. The same has occurred of the Harbor Manage -- I'm sorry, of the Water Resources Management plan. That was also recently approved in its final version and is being promulgated through the State agencies at this point.

We -- Mike has been working with the consultant to develop a full set of rules. We received a first draft of that. It is several hundred pages long, a comprehensive rewrite of the rules and regulations. So, the staff is going through that now with our consultant.

In short, it's going to require additional

1 time for us to complete that task. So, with that, 2 I ask that you consider it, not being an extension 3 of the waterline extension moratorium, for an 4 additional six months, while we continue to try to 5 finish that work. Those are all intersecting That was the intent of the 6 matters, as you know. original moratorium, was to allow us to continue that work. We just have not completed the work 8 9 based upon the workload of the staff and the 10 workload of the consultants helping us with this. 11 COUNCILOR BEYE: Thank you. 12 Anything? 13 COUNCILOR RANDALL WHITE: Under the 14 circumstances, it seems to me to make great sense 15 to extend the moratorium, and I -- in accord with 16 what Administrator Mello was recommending, I move 17 that we do that. 18 COUNCILOR MEAGHER: Second. 19 Hearing a motion and second, THE COURT: 20 is there any discussion? 21 (Pause.) 22 COUNCILOR BEYE: Okay. COUNCILOR RANDALL WHITE: Thank you.

Since we were here for the last of several times on the hearing on four pending water applications, both for extensions and connections, those applications being submitted by Mr. Zimniski and Miss Gagnon from 7 Seaview Ave., the Andreonis from 10 Seaview Ave., the Saletins from 14 Seaview Ave., and Mr. Frechette from 19 Seaview Ave.

Since our last commission session on May 20, 2024, the Town staff, through Mike Gray, in collaboration with our solicitor, Mr. Ruggiero, had prepared, at our urging, a summary document reflecting not only the content of the testimony and evidence presented for hearing by each of the applicants but also the discussion that we had, as a group, after the evidence was closed, at our last session. And I assume since we received it in our

packet, and I think it was available as soon as last Thursday, I wanted to make sure that each of us, as a member of the commission, has had a chance to review and digest each of those letters as they were drafted and presented for our consideration.

And I don't hear anybody who says no. And then also wondering whether anyone has comments or additions or edits or concerns about what was presented in the form of those letters.

COUNCILOR MEAGHER: No. No. I was -- I was impressed. I have a couple of -- just a couple of comments in terms of some specifics.

In terms of the Zimniski/Gagnon application, I believe Dr. Gagnon testified that they were required, before they even purchased the property, to install or with the purchase of the property to install water storage. That's my memory of her testimony, but I'm not looking at the -- at what that -- at what the -- the record is, so I could be wrong about that, but that was just one of my memories, which would speak to their understanding of the problems that go way back.

And also -- and then I believe there was also some discussion about the -- the residue from the RO system in the Saletin property that was put back

into the ground that -- and I believe that their expert acknowledged that that was possibly also making problems with the quality of their water quality. I don't know if those are relevant for whatever. They were two pieces that I found to be somewhat compelling, so I just bring them up here.

COUNCILOR BEYE: Thank you.

Mike?

COUNCILOR MICHAEL WHITE: I actually don't have any comments.

COUNCILOR BEYE: Okay.

COUNCILOR RANDALL WHITE: Under those circumstances, I am prepared to offer four separate motions. Each of these letters that were prepared by Mr. Ruggiero and Mr. Gray, as you all observed, detailed independently the evidence that each of the applicants presented through either their own testimony, their lawyers, or experts, and the letters reflect those contributions individually. I would like to incorporate the letters, which are in the public package, as part of these motions.

And in the first motion, what I would suggest is the following:

That in light of the testimony and evidence received on February 20, May 6, and May 20, as well

as our discussion as a group about the evidence on 1 2 May 20, and the contents of the letter regarding 3 the application of Mr. Zimniski and Dr. Gagnon from 4 7 Seaview Avenue, under all those circumstances and 5 for the reasons and findings laid out in our prior 6 meeting and in the letter, I would move, respectfully, that this commission deny the Zimniski and Gagnon application. 8 9 COUNCILOR MEAGHER: Second. 10 COUNCILOR BEYE: All in -- okay. Thank 11 you. 12 Any discussion? 13 (Pause.) COUNCILOR BEYE: All in favor. 14 15 (Voice vote.) 16 COUNCILOR BEYE: Thank you. 17 COUNCILOR RANDALL WHITE: Separately, I 18 now would move with respect to the application of 19 Glenn and Marjorie Andreoni from 10 Seaview Avenue. 20 There was a similar letter drafted which outlined 21 the evidence as was presented by them and for them, 22 and in light of that evidence and testimony, in 23 light of the discussion we had at our last session 2.4 regarding the quantity and quality of that 25 evidence, and in light of the letter, that I submit

accurately and comprehensively outlines by use of the transcript what was presented at the meeting, I would, similarly, in the case of the Andreonis, move, respectfully, to deny their application.

COUNCILOR MEAGHER: Second.

COUNCILOR BEYE: Okay. We have a motion and second. Any discussion?

(Pause.)

COUNCILOR BEYE: Okay. All in favor.

(Voice vote.)

COUNCILOR BEYE: Okay.

COUNCILOR RANDALL WHITE: The third motion refers to Mr. and Mrs. Saletin, Jeffrey and Deborah Saletin, at 14 Seaview Avenue. And similarly to the prior applicants we have discussed, the letter drafted by Mr. Ruggiero and Mr. Gray outlines the evidence and testimony that was presented at the hearing on the dates that the hearing was held, February 28, May 6 and May 20, and in light of the evidence that was presented, and for reasons that were stated in our discussion as a commission through the offerings of me and Miss Meagher and others at that meeting, and in light of the findings that are laid out in the letter by Mr. Ruggiero and Mr. Gray, I would, similarly, in

their case, respectfully, move that we deny their 1 2 application as well. 3 COUNCILOR MEAGHER: Second. 4 COUNCILOR BEYE: Okay. We have a motion 5 and second. Any discussion? 6 (Pause.) 7 COUNCILOR BEYE: All in favor. (Voice vote.) 8 9 COUNCILOR BEYE: Thank you. 10 COUNCILOR RANDALL WHITE: Finally, in the 11 case of Applicant Frechette from 19 Seaview Avenue, 12 there was testimony and evidence on which was 13 recounted in the record, and it's also in the 14 letter that was prepared by Mr. Gray and 15 Mr. Ruggiero, and we also, in their case, had 16 listened to all the evidence and reviewed it and 17 discussed it in some measure at our May 20 meeting, 18 and for the reasons we have discussed, and for the 19 reasons and findings set forth in the letter, I 20 would move that we respectfully deny 21 Mr. Frechette's application. 22 COUNCILOR MEAGHER: Second. 23 COUNCILOR BEYE: Motion and second. Any 2.4 discussion? 25 (Pause.)
